IARC, a unique organization

Expertise full of history...

Born out of an impetus of international solidarity, the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) was established in 1965 by a resolution of the World Health Assembly as a specialized agency of the World Health Organization (WHO). IARC is the global agency of the United Nations that works for the prevention of cancer.

... beyond borders

IARC is responsible for promoting international collaboration in cancer research. It collaborates in more than 140 countries with governments; international organizations, including WHO; stakeholders from the private and public sectors; and researchers from various disciplines, such as laboratory sciences, bioinformatics, biostatistics, and epidemiology.



70%¹ of deaths due to cancer occur in low- and middle-income countries. IARC prioritizes research with these countries, to provide international answers to national questions.

A catalyst for international progress

IARC's research is recognized by international organizations and governments. The IARC Monographs on the Identification of Carcinogenic Hazards to Humans are renowned and form the basis of prevention policy (tobacco, alcohol, asbestos, and pesticides and other chemicals).

The symbolism of the Nouveau Centre building: a major turning point for IARC

Dr Elisabete Weiderpass has been the Director of IARC since January 2019. "IARC must remain the global reference to propose evidence-based cancer prevention strategies at the global level, with a particular focus on low- and middle-income countries," she states.²


In 2022, IARC will move its headquarters to the Nouveau Centre building, situated in the Biodistrict of Gerland in Lyon. The building symbolizes a new era.

Q/ IARC has to cover the costs of fitting out the Nouveau Centre, estimated to be about 13.4 million euros. How far have you got in financing it?

A/ The project is funded up to 51.6 million euros, shared between the French government and local authorities (the Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes Region, the

Q/ You became the Director of the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) in January 2019. What is your vision of the role?


A/ IARC is an independent organization, a WHO agency, specialized in cancer prevention. Currently, more than 9 million people die of cancer every year. Nearly half of cancers worldwide could be avoided by prevention. We know which interventions work, which are cost-effective, and which prevention programmes can be implemented nationally and locally. Even though IARC does not have a normative role as such, its role is central in public health decisions to save millions of lives.

Q/ In 2022, IARC will move to the Nouveau Centre building in the heart of the Biodistrict in Lyon. In concrete terms, what will this new site bring?

A/ Our research is based essentially on multidisciplinary programmes that combine epidemiology and laboratory research. The site will be equipped with numerous research offices and several laboratories, facilitating this process. Moreover, we will double the capacity of our Biobank. This has become necessary to produce highquality research, because of the increase in sampling and storage of biological samples.

Q/ The culture at IARC is based on open science. How does the Nouveau Centre embody this concept?

A/ The capacity of the new site and the modernity of its equipment will allow us to increase collaborations and partnerships around the world, which will lead to better results. It is a virtuous process. More locally, in Lyon, our presence in the Biodistrict will enable new synergies to form with those involved in research and health already in the area. The Nouveau Centre will promote open access to knowledge for researchers, businesses, and individuals. The infrastructure for hosting and exchanging ideas





Lyon Métropole, and the Ville de Lyon). IARC has to finance fitting out the premises, the technical equipment for the Biobank and the laboratories, and the furniture and audiovisual equipment, for a total of 13.4 million euros. Numerous partners have already pledged their support, and we thank them warmly. We still need to raise 10 million euros. IARC is currently appealing to the generosity of donors so that the Nouveau Centre project will become a reality. Together, we can save millions of lives.

• Equipment for the laboratories and the Biobank.
